"The Far-Right in Germany: How Serious a Threat to Stability?"

The far-right Alternative for Germany party has had a stunning rise: from its origins in 2013 as an anti-euro party of economists and then its "breakthrough" at the national level in 2017 when it won 12.6% in the parliamentary election, it eventually won seats in all 16 of Germany's state legislatures. This September, for the first time, it came in first place in a Germany state election and a close second in two others. What do these electoral breakthroughs mean for German politics and society? Does the far-right party pose a threat to stable governance in Germany? Does its popularity indicate a societal appetite for extremist policies? And how does Germany's far-right compare to similar-seeming parties and movements in other democracies?

Yoder has taught in the Government and Global Studies Departments at Colby College since 1996. She is the author of four books, including the 2024 study, World War II Memory and Contested Commemorations in Europe and Russia. Her research examines collective memory, political culture and identity in post-authoritarian societies, nationalist-populist political parties and movements in Europe, and the integration of eastern and western Europe.



"Democracy and Its Alternatives" Presented by Thomas F. Remington Tuesday, December 17th at 6:30 p.m. and via Zoom: https://lithgowlibrary.libcal.com/event/13099712

What does democracy mean? This year's Camden Conference is focusing on the worldwide retreat from democracy. Populist strongmen have taken over in many countries, from Latin America to Eastern Europe to Asia, and antidemocratic movements have gained ground even in countries formerly thought to be firmly in the democratic camp-including the United States. In this talk, Remington will break down what we mean when we speak of democracy, what its core principles are and are not, and why it invites challenges from the extreme right and left. Citing illustrations from history and the present day, Remington will discuss the problem of majority rule and minority rights, whether democracy is compatible with capitalism, and how democracy can strive to achieve social justice.

Remington is Visiting Professor of Government at Harvard University and Goodrich C. White Professor (Emeritus) of Political Science at Emory University. He is author of a number of books and articles. Among his books are The Returns to Power: A Political Theory of Economic Inequality (Oxford University Press, 2023); Presidential Decrees in Russia: A Comparative Perspective (Cambridge University Press, 2014); and The Politics of Inequality in Russia (Cambridge University



Press, 2011). His research concerns the political sources of economic inequality in the United States, Russia, China and Germany, as well as issues related to education, skill formation, and workforce development. Currently he is writing a book on the role of competition law in the reconstruction of Germany and the European Union after World War II.
